Since 2017, the Santa Cruz Watershed Collaborative (SCWC) has been providing forums for partner agencies and organizations to work toward better aligning their approaches to

watershed management in the Tucson Basin of the Santa Cruz River watershed. SCWC is working toward the vision of people working together to ensure a healthy urban watershed with flowing rivers and streams. In response to a request for input, stakeholders expressed a need for greater coordination and collaboration across the watershed and a more holistic approach to ensuring a sustainable water supply and healthy ecosystems. As a result, after more than three years of collaboration, SCWC adopted a Watershed Restoration Plan in 2022. In this WRRC Brown Bag Webinar presentation, panelists will discuss development of the plan, strategies stakeholders are rallying around to achieve shared goals, and how SCWC is moving forward to address ongoing challenges in the watershed.

New CAP General Manager Appointment Announced

Brenda Burman, who served as Commissioner of the US Bureau of Reclamation between 2017 and 2021, will replace Ted Cooke as General Manager of the Central Arizona Project (CAP) on January 6, 2023. Cooke is retiring from the position he has held since 2016. Of Burman he said, "Her vast experience, coupled with her fresh perspectives, will help her take the reins and lead



the organization through what will undoubtedly be some tough times." Burman, who graduated from Kenyon College in Ohio, has worked collaboratively for over 25 years in the search for solutions to diverse resource challenges. Her work with water resources includes serving as counsel on water and energy for US Senator Jon Kyl and holding senior positions with The Nature Conservancy, Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, and Salt River Project. Burman joined CAP in 2021, acting as executive strategy advisor. Her CAP experience over the past year is expected to facilitate a seamless transition in leadership. As the fifth general manager, she is the first woman appointed to the position.

Indigenous Scholars and Activists Recognized

University of Arizona (UArizona) students, faculty members, and affiliates were among the Indigenous individuals recognized recently for their work. On November 4, Indigenous Resilience Center Director Karletta Chief presented the 2022 Indigenous Resilience Leadership Award to Otakuye Conroy-Ben, Timian M



Godfrey, Janene Yazzie, and Kern Collymore. The award "recognizes outstanding individuals making a positive impact in tribal communities to create healthy environments." Karletta Chief was, herself, selected to be a 2022 Fellow of The WINGS Women of Discovery. This prestigious honor is awarded to "extraordinary women making significant contributions to world knowledge and science through exploration." Additionally, Nikki Tulley, a PhD candidate in the UArizona Department of Environmental Science, received the Centennial Achievement Graduate Student Award. Tulley was nominated for this award by WRRC Director Sharon B. Megdal. Congratulations to these remarkable individuals!

Did You Know?

In Maricopa County, reclaimed water is utilized to cool towers for the Palo Verde nuclear power plant, enhance riparian ecosystems, and recharge groundwater aquifers. Reclaimed water, also known as recycled effluent, is highly treated wastewater. It is a safe alternative source of water for many uses, including irrigation, industrial processes, aquifer recharge, and restoring aquatic and riparian habitats. The use of reclaimed



water in the Phoenix AMA has increased four-fold since 1985. In fact, reclaimed water use has been a longstanding practice for the area, considering it was used by farmers in Phoenix for irrigation purposes as early as 1932. WRRC 104(b) RFP Coming in December

The WRRC's FY 2023 call for 104(b) research grant proposals has been delayed by national level changes to the 104(b) program schedule. Interested researchers at any of Arizona's three universities should look for the Request for Proposals (RFP) in December 2022. As usual, the RFP will invite proposals with strong student involvement for research on regionally relevant water issues. The WRRC evaluates proposals and



selects the individual projects to include in the full proposal it submits to the US Geological Survey (USGS) as part of the Water Resources Research Act program. In this cycle,

selection is likely to occur in March 2023. No important changes in requirements or selection criteria are expected.

In recent years, the USGS has been adjusting the program's calendar in response to changes in federal administrative procedures and the congressional appropriations process. For many years previous, the annual call was announced in early Fall. Proposals were submitted to the WRRC in November, the WRRC's full proposal was due in January, awards were made in February, and projects began March 1. According to the new schedule, the project year has shifted by six months. The USGS will issue the official RFP in March 2023, and awards will be issued around September 1. During this transition period, the WRRC, like other national water institutes generally, is not waiting for the official RFP to solicit research proposals.
