WRRC Director Sharon B. Megdal was honored with an AWRA Member Fellow Award at the AWRA. UCOWR. NIWR 60th Anniversary Joint Water Resources Conference, held September 30 through October 2, 2024, in St. Louis, Missouri. Megdal received the award, which recognizes individuals for their "eminent record in some branch of water resources science and technology," at the conference awards luncheon. The conference, Celebrating the Past and Planning for the Future of Water, marked 60 years since President Lyndon Johnson signed the 1964 Water Resources Research Act, authorizing Water Resources Research Institutes across the country, including the WRRC. That same year saw the formation of the American Water Resources Association (AWRA) and the Universities Council on Water Resources (UCOWR). At the 60th Anniversary reception the evening before receiving her award, Megdal delivered remarks on behalf of the National Institutes for Water Resources (NIWR). She closed the reception program with her remarks and a toast to the past and future impacts made by AWRA, UCOWR, and NIWR. She noted: "I see lots of energy, optimism, and can-do attitude at all three associations. I am optimistic that we are well-positioned to contribute meaningfully to identifying solutions to our local, regional, and global water challenges."

in Australia – Lessons Learned from Australian Government Policy Developers and How They Are Learning to Work on Genuine Efforts to Engage Effectively

In this WRRC Water Webinar, presenters will discuss how the effects of colonization have long-lasting and inter-generational impacts on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and their access to inland waters. Empowering First Nations peoples to access, manage, and own water is crucial for ensuring their well-being and self-determination. The presentation will also discuss how meaningful engagement is critical for shaping effective water management policies and will draw on lessons learned from Australian Government policy developers, who are increasingly recognizing the need for genuine, culturally informed engagement. Historically, top-down approaches have failed to capture the diverse voices and needs of First Nations communities, resulting in gaps in





water allocation and resource management. However, recent policy shifts demonstrate a growing commitment to integrating Indigenous knowledge, respecting community protocols, and prioritizing long-term partnerships. Successful efforts have centered on mutual respect, transparency, and shared decision-making, allowing for more sustainable and equitable water management practices. The development of the Aboriginal Water Entitlement program, for example, highlights the importance of addressing both historical grievances and current needs through trust-building and capacity development. The lessons underscore that while government frameworks are improving, there is still a need for continuous learning, listening, and adapting policy to suit the unique governance structures, values, and knowledge systems of Indigenous communities.


WRRC Special Event: Living River: The Promise of the Mighty Colorado Author Talk and Book Signing

picture of the living Colorado River and the challenges it faces, and will inspire people of all walks of life to cherish and protect the life, beauty, and resilience of this dynamic life force. Featuring stunning photography and powerful essays, *Living River* captures

breathtaking landscapes rich with wildlife from upper Colorado's tributary Fraser River to the southwestern Gila and San Pedro Rivers. Showalter works throughout the ecosystems of the Intermountain West and has published two other books, *Sage Spirit: The American West at a Crossroads* (Braided River) and *Prairie Thunder: The Nature of Colorado's Great Plains* (Skyline Press). With *Living River* and conservation story-telling, he seeks to take readers on a journey to see themselves as part of nature and the community of living things, engendering empathy, caring, and love of the natural world—the genesis of meaningful conservation.

The Weekly Wave is Moving to a New Platform!



Verde River Watershed Conference Highlights Partnerships

Last week, WRRC Associate Director Jamie McEvoy had the opportunity to attend the State of the Verde Watershed Conference in Camp Verde, AZ. The conference is organized by the Friends of the Verde River every two years. The Verde River is one of two Wild and Scenic Rivers in Arizona, a rare perennial waterway, and an important tributary to the Salt River. Data from the US Geological Survey shows that flow in the Verde River has been declining since the 1990s. The conference highlighted partnerships and underscored their importance for achieving conservation goals. Tanya Lewis, Chairwoman of the Yavapai-Apache Nation, delivered an opening keynote via video, as she was traveling to Washington DC to <u>testify</u> in support of the Yavapai-Apache Nation Water Rights Settlement Act. Panel discussions focused on upland management, as well as riparian and aquatic management. Tracy Stephens with Friends of the Verde River gave an overview of the <u>Verde</u> <u>River Watershed Report Card</u>, which provides an assessment of watershed health. Several talks addressed



stormwater management and green infrastructure plans to enhance streamflow in the Verde River, such as the **2023 Northern Arizona Council of Governments' plan**. Bruce Babbitt, the 16th Governor of Arizona and former Secretary of the Interior, gave a notable keynote address that discussed key challenges in the Upper, Middle, and Lower Verde Watersheds.


